
"Bangla Time Travel" Magical Prints by Birgitta Volz

About the magic prints of Birgitta Volz:

Usually I print the bark of old and special trees.

They often present me with different stories, depending on their continent and their cultural environment.

It seems as if the trees record the history of their place and of its "clandestine" inhabitants.

I rarely see images on the bark.

They are becoming visible to me only later in the studio.

As most people are usually not able to see them easily, I sometimes shade with colour pencils around the beings and faces which I discover.

I try not to manipulate but to unveil them.

While looking at the romantic ruins of Dubolhati palace, where the 9th episode of the "Uronto Residential Art Exchange Program" took place in December 2019, I felt inspired to print some of the rotten plaster structures of the decaying palace walls.

Some of the results are now published in this documentation.

It seems quite magic to me, how many Bangladeshi stories unfolded from the plaster.


The results were exhibited in Dubolhati palace in December 2019 and in a solo exhibition in Aurodhan Art Gallery, Pondicherry, India in January 2020. 30 works will be shown under "Uronto Artist Community" during the Dhaka Art Summit in February 2020.





Mud made icons of the goddess Durga are plunged every year with a ceremony into the flooded fields and ponds to ensure a good harvest.







It seems like a miracle that it appeared on one of the plaster prints.







Botanical Prints:

Birgitta's botanical prints seem to be very natural, but they are far from being simple copies of nature.

Unpretentious at first glance, her prints reveal themselves as carefully arranged, fantastical compositions. Her work with flowers is so far the most challenging technical task for this experienced print maker because their delicate structures often fall apart at the first touch of the printing ink. Then they have to be recomposed as a complex collage, petal by petal and leaf by leaf. Playing with different shades of grey, she skillfully combines them to create depth and space, constructing a giant puzzle and an inventive patience game. On the question of what she wants to express with her art work, Birgitta replies: "I want people to open up to the beauty and vulnerability of nature. My aim is to create a consciousness which is guiding the spectator above the superficial aspect of obvious beauty, so that some manage to gain access to the spiritual aspects of nature".


